## OUR VISION

---

One day, students of all ages will be scientifically literate, teachers will be prepared and empowered to teach accurate science, and scientific thinking and decision-making will ensure that all life can thrive and overcome challenges to our shared future.

---



**2025 was a momentous year** in many respects. It marked the 100th anniversary of the famed Scopes “monkey” trial challenging an anti-evolution education law in Tennessee. It also marked the 20th anniversary of the *Kitzmiller v. Dover* decision that found the teaching of “intelligent design” in public classrooms unconstitutional. The National Center for Science Education celebrated both, co-sponsoring a two-day symposium with Vanderbilt University’s Evolutionary Studies Initiative and producing a popular webinar series, among other things, to mark the occasions.

But 2025 was also a very challenging year for science: funding continued to be denied to research institutions, trusted resources such as [climate.gov](https://climate.gov) were shuttered, and accepted science like anthropogenic climate change came under attack.

As teachers, schools, and like-minded non-profits navigated this uncertain landscape, we continued our advocacy work, monitoring ideological incursions into the science classroom, and built upon our regionally based coastal-resilience professional learning opportunities called My COAST. We created more free “Story Short” lessons for teachers and led workshops all over the country. But we knew we needed to do more. So we formed a study group of teachers interested in implementing an NCSE-developed science and media literacy tool called DataWISE to help students see through the science misinformation that is so pervasive. We welcomed our second cohort of Sound Science Fellows, providing higher education faculty and museum educators the opportunity to enhance professional learning in climate science, evolution, and the nature of science for K–12 teachers. We launched a podcast aimed at combating misconceptions about climate change and evolution. We also began building strategic partnerships, laying the groundwork for a new program to be launched in 2026 that connects scientists, institutions, and organizations that address persistent challenges to teaching science in public schools. I am excited by this new program’s potential impact!

Overall, our Science Education and Outreach team led professional learning opportunities in 12 states, with 3,986 contact hours (meaning face-to-face time) with educators. Among those experiences was our annual NCSE-sponsored Evolution Symposium at the National Association of Biology Teachers conference during which Lindsay Hunter and Rick Hunter captivated the audience as they told the tale of the discovery of *Homo naledi* in the Rising Star cave system.

In 2025, Catalyzing Action, which monitors and mobilizes against legislation and policy developments that threaten the accurate teaching of climate science and evolution, helped defeat anti-science bills in five states and rallied support for quality state science standards in three states. Of particular note, NCSE provided support needed to convince the North Dakota legislature not to add “intelligent design” to its state science standards. Our research program, Investigating Science Education, published a review article on overcoming obstacles to evolution and climate change as well as published three articles in collaboration with a team of outside researchers.

We had much to celebrate in 2025, even as the national landscape provided grim reminders of the need to continue the fight for science and science education. We at NCSE are committed to continuing that fight in 2026 and beyond!

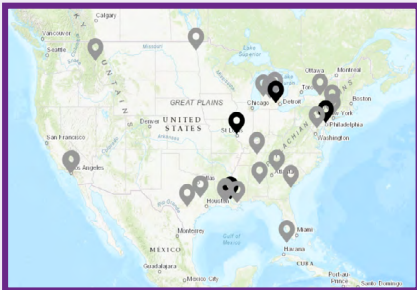

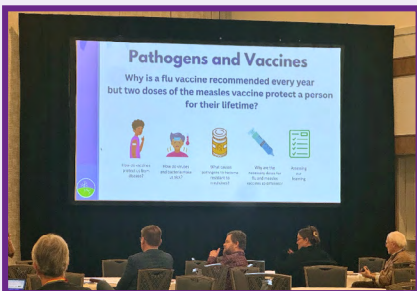
